INDIANA VOTER TURNOUT

All elections matter. But it's no secret that not all elections are the same at least in the eyes of the voters. The numbers who make the effort to cast their ballot (whether on Election Day or in advance) vary widely. Consider the three different elections at right: 2014 primary (limited number of races in most areas), 2012 general (presidential, gubernatorial and a widely-watched U.S. Senate race at the top of the ticket) and 2010 general (U.S. Senate and House campaigns).

This year does not include a U.S. Senate race in the state and what are generally considered to be less competitive than normal U.S. House battles. How that impacts turnout will be seen in November.
